### **2016 Berkeley JACL Pioneers**

Kiyoshi Katsumoto and Gordon Yamamoto are this year's Berkeley JACL Pioneers. They are being honored for their years of service to several community organizations and the JACL.

### ***Kiyoshi Katsumoto***

Kiyoshi joined the Berkeley JACL chapter in 1980 and served two years as President in 1982-83. He remembers the many wonderful people in the Berkeley chapter. Previously he was a member of the Fremont JACL (shortly after graduating from high school) and served as President of the chapter in 1958. Kiyoshi

remembers this exciting period for the JACL and the numerous issues that needed to be addressed. In spite of the war time experiences of being incarcerated and the many struggles his family faced in rebuilding their lives after the war, Kiyoshi always felt fortunate of having a supportive family and community, especially the JA community.

Born on May 4, 1936, Kiyoshi is the fourth of five children, and grew up on a farm in Decoto, CA (now part of Union City). After Pearl Harbor, he and his family were incarcerated first in Tanforan, then in Topaz, Utah. After the war ended, his family returned to Decoto and after a few years bought a farm in Fremont. He graduated from Washington Union High School in Fremont in 1953. After graduation he managed and operated the family farm, but eventually, the farm was turned into new housing tracts.

Thereafter in 1960, Kiyoshi attended evening classes at San Jose City College. He transferred to San Jose State University and graduated in 1964 with a B.S. degree in Chemistry. He was accepted to UC Berkeley and obtained his PhD in Chemistry in 1968. Following graduation, Kiyoshi went to work at Chevron Research Co. in Richmond and married Emiko (Endo). The couple purchased their home in El Cerrito and raised their two children, David and Tamiko. His work took him to many different parts of the country and a six month stint in Italy. After 29 years with Chevron, Kiyoshi retired in 1997.

His wife's family was long-time members of the Buddhist Church of Oakland so he joined Emiko and became an active member of the church. He served as the BCO President in 1977. Several years after, Kiyoshi and Emiko moved their membership to the Berkeley Buddhist Temple to be nearer their home and so that their children could attend church with their friends. After retirement, Kiyoshi joined the Board of Directors of the Berkeley Buddhist Temple in 2002 and served as President of the Board from 2006 to 2010. Today, he serves as the Co-Treasurer of the Temple.

Kiyoshi recognizes the wonderful benefits of the El Cerrito community and the great environment that he and his children had while growing up there. In 1996, he joined the El Cerrito Crime Prevention Committee and served for 10 years, five of them as Chairman. He worked closely with the El Cerrito Police Dept - one lasting legacy was the formation and development of community policing. In this program, residents were encouraged to get to know their neighbors and form "neighbors watch groups".

### ***Gordon Yamamoto***

Gordon has worn a number of hats for the Berkeley JACL. He has been President, Recording Secretary, and newsletter writer for a number of years. He became a director for the Berkeley JACL in 1976 and has continued to be on the board unabated. During part of his tenure as an officer of the Berkeley Chapter, (in the absence of a child sitter) his 7-year-old son would attend the meetings with coloring book or reading book in hand while his father would blather along. Gordon fervently hopes that he will “not be the last man standing” when he retires from the JACL board.

Gordon is a “farm boy” who grew up in Central California in the then-small town of Clovis. Gordon’s father, Tokuo Yamamoto, was active in many community activities, including the church, school, and JACL. His father was active in the JACL because he passionately believed in civil rights and did not ever want to see the type of racism and breach of civil liberties he experienced during the World War II and the threats of violence or angry guns firing in the night in his neighborhood even after the War. By example and words, Gordon’s father’s deeds left a lasting impact on him in the values and purposes of the JACL.

Gordon’s mother Anna and his father both were interned in Poston during World War II. But for the War, it was not likely that Gordon’s parents would have ever met since his Mother grew up in Seattle, Washington, and was perfect “city girl” and quite content living there until the War unexpectedly happened.

Gordon attended UC Berkeley on an academic and wrestling scholarship and wore the “Blue and Gold” proudly. At *Cal*, he lived through Vietnam, campus protests, People’s Park, long hair, and working out in tear-gas laden air inside Harmon gymnasium. He majored in speech and rhetoric and engaged in linguistic science, argumentation, and poetry. As part of his major, Gordon participated in the Cal Spring Speech contest - he totally appalled one judge and won over two other judges to win the competition with a monolog by the satirist and abrasive comic Lennie Bruce.

Following undergraduate, Gordon continued at Cal and earned a teaching credential and received a graduate degree in education. While earning his graduate degree, Gordon helped his former coach train the Cal wrestlers. On the verge of accepting a teaching

offer, Gordon was admitted to the Hastings School of Law in San Francisco. While at Hastings, he also trained for the Olympics and was able wrestle for the Olympic coach who by chance was a local of San Mateo in the hopes of making the Olympic team.

Gordon graduated from Hastings in 1974 and started practicing and is still practicing law. While engaging in the profession of law, Gordon also picked up his broker’s license and started a real estate company. He is also profoundly grateful for the opportunities scholarships provided and passes on his best wishes for this year’s scholarship recipients.

### ***Al Satake to be Honored at the JACL NCWNP District Awards Banquet & Celebration***

### **Register to Vote**

The JACL is helping to register API's to vote in future elections. APIVote does not push a political agenda, only asking that you pay attention to the issues and vote in the best interests of your family, your business and the environment. You will receive a call from us in the near future to help you register to vote.

From 2000-2010, the AAPI citizen voting age population (CVAP) in CA grew by 38%, compared to

10% for the statewide population. The largest AAPI ethnic groups in CA include: Filipino (1.5 mil), Chinese (1.5 mil), Vietnamese (687,000), Indian (638,000), Korean (526,000), and Japanese (426,000).

About 71% of Asian Americans in California speak a language other than English at home; of those, about half speak English less than "very well." This is one of challenges to voter participation. Voter contact is a large, unmet need among AAPIs. In the 2012 AAPI Post-Election Survey of registered voters, 74% of Pacific Islanders and 69% of Asian Americans received no contact about the election (compared to 64% of Latinos, 61% of African Americans, and 57% of whites). In California, the lack of contact among Asian Americans was even higher, at 80% of registered voters. There is also a large opportunity for voter education through contact.

### **Day of Remembrance at Cal**

### **Iwao Lewis Suzuki**

Lewis Suzuki passed away on January 24, 2016 in Berkeley, CA. Lewis was born November 29, 1920, in Los Angeles, CA. Lewis attended the Otis Art Institute. He moved to Washington, D.C., attended more art classes, and worked for the Japanese embassy. After the bombing of Pearl Harbor, Lewis joined the U.S. Army and taught Japanese language for the Military Intelligence Service (MIS) in Minneapolis.

Lewis was a lifelong peace activist and artist. Among his many awards are the Congressional Gold Medal (2010) for his service in the Military Intelligence Service. He served on the Berkeley Art Commission and was recognized by the City of Berkeley in 2010. Lewis was inducted into the Community Hall of Fame at La Pena Cultural Center in Berkeley, which recognizes cultural activism for social change. In 2012, he received the Dr. Clifford I. Uyeda Peace and Humanitarian Award by the Bay Area Day of Remembrance Consortium. Lewis was recognized as one of the 2013 Berkeley JACL Pioneers.

### **Pacific Citizen Update**

The Pacific Citizen (PC) was tasked with creating a financial plan to eliminate its deficit. The National Board, the PC Editorial Board and the PC staff have had numerous meetings, conference calls and email exchanges to discuss the available options. The PC is instructed to raise over \$300,000 dollars to offset its operating deficit. This is an unattainable goal and everyone involved in the discussions setting this amount as a revenue goal knows it. A variety of options are looked at to try to achieve goal. So choose your poison. Your feedback is important so do NOT hesitate to let us know your thoughts on this issue.

P.C.'s expenses have been cut 52% in two years. The budget for the next biennium is expected to top \$315,000 while the allocation from the JACL membership funds will continue to decrease (estimated \$82,000 for 2016, \$73,000 for 2017 and \$62,000 for 2018). The P.C. must subsidize the difference between the budgeted amount and the allocated membership funds from JACL.

### **P.C. Finance Plan**

Both plans involve the following:

- Increasing nonmember subscriber subscription increase of \$50 vs. \$40: \$6,000
- Rent: \$13,500 annual reduction from previous year
- Print/Mailing Reductions: Should 20% choose to receive the digital-only option, a savings of \$20,000 annually would occur in reduced costs to the P.C.
- Spring Campaign donation with a target of \$100,000.
- Increase membership: Working with Membership chair to run ads in P.C. to gain new members and urge membership donations.

### **Plan A**

- Membership Surcharge to those members who choose to receive a printed hard copy of the P.C. The current price of an annual subscription of the P.C. is \$50. Based upon a 50% discount, a surcharge of an additional \$25 is proposed. Of the estimated 6,100 JACL members, if 80% choose to receive a hard copy, the revenue earned would be an additional \$122,000. The Surcharge Motion would be written by a sponsoring chapter that would present the motion to the National Council at the 2016 JACL National Convention.

### **Plan B**

- Develop and execute Spring Campaign to appeal to membership to donate funds to sustain P.C.'s daily operational expenses. P.C. Board members will write letters to membership, starting off with Board Chair Carol Kawamoto in the March 4 issue. P.C. will publicize campaign. A progress thermometer will be established to keep track of goal. Monthly drawings of Fugetsu-Do manju will be given to those who donate \$150 or more.
- Increase advertising revenue: \$5,000-\$10,000 annually. Develop new relationships with JACL corporate sponsors to advertise in P.C., work with new agencies to enlist new advertisers.

These plans would be in addition to the general revenue P.C. earns in a given year, including (advertising revenue, nonmember subscriptions, etc.). As a program of JACL, the P.C. has been serving the membership for 87 years. It is imperative that it continues to further document the Japanese American experience.
